Doctors, counselors, and well-meaning teachers set the stage for Shelbi to build her self-determination and overcome obstacles in her path. That one simple word fueled Shelbi's persistence that lead her down a path to become who she dreamed of being. After many struggles and victories, Shelbi graduated from Texas A&M University with her degree is University Studies with an emphasis in Ag Leadership and minored in Communication and Youth Development.

Being awarded, in 2017, with the first Peer-to-Peer Training Certification in Texas was one of Shelbi's greatest achievements! This milestone has ignited her passion to change lives by empowering others to advocate for themselves and dream BIG! Shelbi has also pledged herself to advocate for others and be a voice when they cannot. Envisioning a world where many more can feel safe, secure, and important, keeps Shelbi striving toward her new goals.

Since her graduation, Shelbi has applied her leadership skills across various areas, with new opportunities emerging right before her. Her first full-time position was as a Program Assistant for the HOPS (Horticulture Options in Plant Sciences) Program. This one-year certification programs offers adults with disabilities the chance to receive training, education, and employment in the horticulture field. Another significant opportunity arose when she launched her own "Shelbi Show" in early May 2022. This show fulfills a long-held dream of hers, aimed at providing encouragement, support, and hope to anyone facing challenges. As the show progresses, Shelbi plans to share her own journey as well as others, and interview those across the nation who are dedicated to supporting and advocating for those with lived experiences.

Strategies and Recommendations to Reduce Disruptions and Disparities Among Youth with **Disabilities Aging Out of Public Programs**

Low-income youth with disabilities are at risk of losing coverage, disability income supports, and continuity of care when they transition into adulthood.


This presentation underscores the little attention that has been paid to the disruptions and disparities in public program access faced by transition-aged youth with disabilities, particularly Black youth, as they age into adulthood.

This was a two-year effort to examine the experience when youth and young adults with disabilities age out of Medicaid, the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), the Supplemental Security Income (SSI) program, and Title V Programs for Children and Youth with Special Health Care Needs (CYSHCN).

This presentation highlights recommendations to address gaps, complexities, and disparities for each of the public programs studied. The recommendations were drawn from the findings from key informant and self-advocate interviews, literature and program document reviews, online surveys, analysis of national survey data, and a five-state case study.
